BY HIS HONOUR EDMOND HOWARD LACAM GORGES, A MEMBER OF THE ROYAL VICTORIAN ORDER, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE PROTECTORATE OF SOUTH WEST AFRICA IN MILITARY OCCUPATION OF THE UNION FORCES.

UNDER and by virtue of the authority in mensted, I do hereby declare, proclaim and make mown that, from and after the date hereof, the provisions of the Union Prisons and Reformatories Act, (No. 13 of 1911) shall, together with all Prison Service Orders and Regulations that have been and may, from time to time, be issued thereunder, be inforce and have the effect of Law in the Protectorate of South West Africa, so far as circumstances permits provided that for the purposes of the administration of the said Act within the said Protectorate the following substitutions shall be and are hereby made in the mid Act, and Prison Service Orders and Regulations made thereunder, viz:

- 1. the Administrator for the Governor-General, Minister, or Judge of the Supreme Court;
- 2. the Secretary for the Protectorate and the Deputy Secretary for the Protectorate for the Director of Prisons and Assistant Director of Prisons respectively;
- 3. the Protectorate for the Union;
- 4. the Military Magistrate or Detached Assistant Military Magistrate for the Resident Magistrate;

- 5. Court of the Military Magistrate or Detached Assistant Military Magistrate for Court of the Resident Magistrate;
- 6. Regulation 531, first paragraph, shall read "Executions shall take place at Windhuk".

SALE OF EXCESS GOODS, LUGGAGE. PARCELS AND UNCLAIMED PROPERTY.

A list of Excess Goods, Luggage, Parcels and other unclaimed property on hand at the Railway Excess Depot, Windhuk, lies for inspection at the office of the Assistant Director of Railways, Room 5, Windhuk.

The proceeds of such sale, less 10%, may be claimed by owners of any property so sold, on their definitely establishing their claim thereto, within a period of three years from date of such sale, after which no claims will be entertained.

In the case of perishables referred to in the third paragraph hereof, owners must lodge their claims for refund of amount realised, less 10 %, within three months of sale, after which no claims will be entertained.

No. 22.] [25th May, 1916. MARTIAL LAWY REGULATIONS.

Regulations Nos. 46-50 issued under Martial Law by and with the approval of i HIS HONOUR THE ADMINISTRATOR, with effected from and after the date of publication.

INTERPRETATION (COF REGULATIONS.

46. Wherever in any Malartial Law Regulation mention is made of a Commississioned Officer of the South African Mounted Riflementh or a non-Commissioned Officer of the said Force, tithe same shall, unless contrary to the intention and mmeaning of such regulation be taken to mean and tolo include a Commissioned Officer of the Military Commissioned Officer of the sesaid Force.

CONTAGIOUSIS DISEASE.

47. If the Medical Officer r of any District shall have good ground to believe thinat any person within his District is affected with sysuphilis, it shall be the duty of such Medical Officer inin case such person is not under medical treatment byby some duly qualified medical practitioner, to report the fact to the Military Magistrate, who shall therereupon make enquiry into the circumstances, and if if upon such inquiry such Military Magistrate shall dedeem fit so to do, it shall be lawful for him to authorivise the said Medical Officer to require the person so afaffected to place himself or herself under medical treatatment by the said Medical Officer or some other dulyly qualified medical practi tioner to be selected by such affected person, and to attend for that purpose at at the time and place from time to time fixed by the sesaid Medical Officer or duly qualified practitioner until it released from such attendance.

If any person duly required by any Medical Officer as in the foregoing sesection mentioned, to place himself or herself under medical treatment, shall neglect or refuse to attended for that purpose at any time or place fixed by these said Medical Officer or Medical practitioner, such person shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding fiftive pounds, and in default of payment to imprisonmerent, with or without hard labour, for any period not texceeding one month, unless such fine be sooner paicid, or to both such fine and imprisonment.

RAILWAY CLILOAK ROOM REGULAATIONS.

1. Deposit of Artichles in Cloak Room.

48. No article or package sishall be considered as being deposited in a cloak room a unless the person desiring to deposite such article or p-package shall have handed over the same to an Officieer in charge of the cloak room, and shall have paid d for and received a cloak room ticket issued by the i-Railway Administration in respect of the article or pacackage so deposited.

2. Delivery too Depositor.

The Railway Administration shall not be liable to give up any article or parackage deposited in a clouk room except on productions of the cloak room ticket issued in respect thereof, f, and on payment of all charges which, in accordance with these regulations, have or may become payabable in respect of the same.

3. Charges for Deposit.

A charge of twopence per article or package deposited shall be made by the Railway Administration, and shall be payable by the depositor at the time of deposit; and an additional charge of twopence per day or part of a day, shall he made on every article or package left in the cloak room for a longer period than the day following the day of deposit.

4. Articles of greater value than £5.

- a) The Railway Administration shall not be liable for the loss, mis-delivery, detention of or damage to any article or package deposited in a cloak room which exceeds in value the sum of Five Pounds unless at the time of deposit the value of such article is declared and, in addition to the ordinary charges for deposit, a sum of sixpence is paid for each five pounds sterling, or fraction of five pounds of the declared value in excess of the sum of five pounds sterling; and a further charge of sixpense for each five pounds sterling or fraction thereof in excess of the value of five pounds must be paid for every week or part of a week during which such article or package shall be left in the cloak room.
- b) In no case will the Railway Administration accept an article or package for deposit in the cloak room of a greater value than one hundred pounds sterling without the special agreement of the Station Master of the station at which the cloak room is
- c) The Railway Administration reserves the right to examine the contents of any package declared to contain articles of a higher value than five pounds sterling with the object of being convinced that the package actually contains the articles declared to be For this purpose any package must be spened by the depositor at his own expense, if so required by the Officer in charge of the cloak room or the Station Master, and the same must be securely re-fastened by the depositor.
- d) The Railway Administration may require that packages that have been declared at a higher value than five pounds sterling, if conveniently capable of being sealed, shall be carefully sealed by the depositor, and afterwards sealed by the Railway Administration; and if delivery is made with those seals intact, no liability for loss or damage shall attach to the Railway Administration.

5. Loss of Cloak Room Ticket

Should a passenger lose his cloak room ticket he may obtain the articles deposited upon making a sworn affidavit before a justice of the peace, in which he shall describe the mariner of the loss of the cloak room ticket, the article of package deposited by him, as also the contents, to the satisfaction of the Railway Administration; and further upon signing an indemnity in the prescribed form indemnifying the Railway Administration against all claims of other persons in

respect of such article or package delivered without production of the original cloak room ticket. The Railway Administration may, in addition, to such indemnity, demand adequate security from the claimant before parting with the article or package as aforesaid.

6. Maximum Period of Deposit.

No article or package shall be allowed to remain deposited in a cloak room for a longer period than six calendar months, and all articles not claimed and taken away within such period of six months after deposit may be sold by the Railway Administration to defray expenses.

THE IMPORTATION OF "MALLEIN" INTO THE PROTECTORATE

49. The importation of "Mallein" into the Protectorate without the authority of the Assistant Director of Veterinary Services is prohibited.

Any person who shall import or attempt to import or otherwise dispose of, or be found in possession of or inject any animal with "mallein", unless he has received the authority of the Assistant Director of Veterinary Services, Windhuk, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.

LÜDERITZBUCHT AS COMPULSORY PILOTAGE HARBOUR.

50. The Harbour of Lüderitzbucht is hereby declared to be a compulsory Pilotage Harbour, save and except in respect of the following:

- a) Vessels of His Majesty's Navy when entering or leaving.
- b) Vessels calling with a frequency of at least once per mensem when leaving.

The charges shall be:

For pilotage in and out £5.0.0.

For pilotage in, only, £3.0.0. For pilotage between the hours 1 hour before sundown and 6 a.m. sh 10/- per hour additional.

The Railway and Harbours Administration and a Pilot who is a servant thereof shall be exempt from liability for any loss or damage that may arise or be caused through the act, omission or default of such Pilot.

Any person who harbours or in any manner whatsoever assists this escaped Prisoner of War to evade re-capture shall be guilty of an offence and will be severely dealt with under Marlial Law.
